WINTER DRIVING IN PARK COUNTY

Winter driving in Park County can be challenging at times with the weather, so be sure to be prepared, and remember, you are ultimately responsible for yourself.

First of all, know before you go! You can access http://www.cotrip.org/home.htm, the official Colorado state site for the latest information on travel alerts, road conditions, and road closures. Secondly, make sure you are dressed for the weather, or at least have a real coat. A temperature of -10°F, and with the wind blowing at just 30mph, gives a healthy person about 10 minutes before frostbite sets in. These are your digits and possibly your life.

Driving...pretend you have your grandmother's favorite stew....on your seat...no lid. Drive steady, smooth, and don't slam on the brakes or gas.

To be prepared for a winter driving emergency, I carry a black backpack with extra gear from October - May. I do carry lots of extra stuff, because when it really blows, I get out the big truck and go out to rescue folks and one pack is easy to move around.

WINTER EMERGENCY PACK:

Fleece Hat, Long - For ear coverage

Fleece Neck Gaiter - Cover neck and face; tuck into jacket

Extra Gloves - In case they get wet

Extra insulated Socks - If your feet get wet...you are gonna suffer

Goggles!!! Yellow Tint - easier to see at night; keeps your eyeballs from freezing, literally

Insulated Boot Gaiters

Cheap Mylar/space Blankets, and maybe a smaller fleece blanket

10-12 chemical heaters

LED Flash light, extra batteries

1 MRE

2 Bottles of Water

Trucks:

30 foot Recovery Strap w/loops good to 20,000 lbs plus, NO hooks. I've seen them come off and go THROUGH vehicles.

D Rings, large and small to latch onto smaller vehicles

Shovel

HD Jumper Cables

Lastly, if you do get stuck in nasty foul weather **DO NOT** leave the vehicle. Stay with it, and keep the exhaust clear so that carbon monoxide (CO) doesn't build up in the cab.

Be safe; stay warm. See you all **ON** the road! :)

2018 IMPOA FINANCIAL AUDIT

On Saturday, October 27, 2018, an audit team composed of IMPOA Board members Jeff Mason (Treasurer) and Jim Scherrer (Secretary), along with IMPOA member Sonja Becker, met with Karen Goodman (prior IMPOA Treasurer) for the purpose of reviewing financial transactions for the fiscal year ended August 31, 2018. The team verified that the Balance Sheet and Statement of Income and Expenses as of August 31, 2018 match corresponding figures noted in the bank reconciliations, bank statements, and Paypal records, and reported that the financial statements accurately reflected the financial condition of IMPOA for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2018. The IMPOA board posted the audit team's full report on www.IMPOA.net.

FIREWISE - 2019

"FIREWISE USA" is the title of the program sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association to teach people how to adapt to living in areas that are high risk areas for wildfires. This program encourages neighbors to work together and take action now to prevent damage and losses in the future. Indian Mountain is one of the over 1,500 recognized communities across the United States. Some insurance companies actually give discounts if you live in a FIREWISE certified community. This certification is awarded based on the effort documented by property owners to reduce potential sources of fuel at their residence and the property around it.

While most of the work to perform wildfire mitigation is done in the summer, there are things that a property owner can do throughout the year, especially spring and fall. There are brochures available at the Indian Mountain Community Center and there will be displays available at the IMMD and IMPOA Board meetings beginning this spring (probably beginning in March) and at various community activities. You can also go to the link below to download a worksheet to remind you of what you can do, and to track the time and money you spend on your property. We will call for this documentation next fall to use to tabulate what the residents of IM have done to complete our annual application. In 2018, based on the FIREWISE application formulas, you and your neighbors generated over \$123,000 in credits.

The two primary activities that we do as a community involve the "Burn Pit" and "Chipping Days." Unfortunately, the drought conditions have restricted when we can burn the material that has been brought to the Burn Pit. We are currently investigating alternative ways to use the Burn Pit so that fuel removed from your property can be turned into firewood and/or burned, chipped, and removed from IM. We contract with the Coalition for the Upper Platte (CUSP) to bring large machines to chip slash on your property to help with wildfire mitigation and put potential nutrition back into your soil. CUSP services many counties in central Colorado and we have to schedule work days with them ASAP. The way a "chipping day" works is that property owners stack cut trees, branches, and dead wood, along their driveway or along their property line along the road in front of their property. We will estimate the amount of time needed to chip this material. We will schedule about 6 hours of work on a given day. All of the property owners or a representative for the property owner will work that day to feed the "chipper." If you have never done this, we encourage you to help on a day before we get to your property - for a couple of hours or the whole day. To get on the CUSP calendar, we have reserved the following days for 2019. We will determine whose property will be done on which days based on the size of your project and the location of your property. If you think there is more than 4 hours needed for your property, we will break it into two work days so we have plenty of workers. The current rate is \$85 per hour. We try to work properties in proximity of each other to maximize the amount of work time and minimize the amount of travel time. The following dates have been reserved:

VOLUNTEER INTEREST FORM

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IMMD WATER SERVICE PROGRAM (WSP) UPDATE

On January 1, 2019 the second group of participants joined the WSP. There were 354 enrollees in 2018, 57 in 2019, and two participants that have dropped out, leaving a total of 409 current participants.

Monthly reports to the board from the program administrator indicate that a few people do not get their meter readings in on time, but there are no chronic offenders. Thanks for your effort.

Bret Crouch, Samantha Bertin and Roger Mattson met with the HASP board of directors in November to review progress to date. HASP supplies the augmentation water for wells that take part in the WSP. Its board was pleased with IMMD's performance in managing the WSP to date.

Discussions with HASP at the meeting and since have resulted in a general plan for future water purchases by IMMD. The near term is governed by the remaining year in the current intergovernmental agreement (IGA) between HASP and IMMD. For this last year, people can apply in 2019 to enter the program in January 2020. These 2019 enrollees will be the last group to enter the program under the current IGA. Once those people are added to the program, the cumulative total of enrollments will be registered with Park County to show their rights to augmentation water through the HASP augmentation plans.

In the longer term, IMMD and HASP will negotiate a new IGA to allow Indian Mountain property owners to continue to enter the program in the years beyond 2020. Work on that new agreement will begin in 2019. There may be changes in the conditions of the second IGA compared to the first IGA. For example, HASP has not raised its price for water in ten years and water costs continue to rise, so there might be a cost adjustment.

On January 12, 2019, the IMMD board approved the cost, schedule and other conditions for the 2019 applications to the WSP under the current IGA. The conditions were identical to those recommended by the WSP Community Water Advisory Committee in early January. Here are the details:

- 1. The application period will begin on March 1, 2019 and run until July 31, 2019.
- 2. The application fee will be \$810.00. This fee covers the cost of the augmentation water for each well. It is a one-time charge. The ownership of the augmentation water through the WSP/HASP program goes with the land in perpetuity.
- Any property owner may apply for entry to the WSP this year. This means vacant land
 owners may apply for the program and will receive an augmentation certificate even though
 they have not yet built a house or drilled a well. HASP encouraged IMMD to provide this new
 choice under the current IGA.
- 4. All participants in the WSP, whether they have a well or not, will pay the same annual administration fee. That fee for 2019 has been set by the IMMD board at \$100, the same amount as in 2018. The administration fee for 2020 will be set by the board in late 2019 and will be, as required by the program's operations manual, reasonable and actual costs (no profit).

The Water Advisory Committee also recommended that a reserve fund is a prudent best business practice to help cover the costs of unplanned and unforeseen events (e.g. a requirement to remediate a historic low flow in Tarryall Creek to which the WSP's augmentation water ultimately flows or unanticipated litigation). The Committee recommended creation of a separate reserve account under the current WSP Administration account and that \$20,000, taken from the 2018 year-ending balance in the WSP administration account, be used to start this reserve account. The committee also

recommended setting this reserve account aside in certificates of deposit. The IMMD board will soon consider these recommendations in a regular board meeting.


LARRY SIVERSON
