Hello from the IMMD Board,

On behalf of your Board of Directors of the Indian Mountain Metropolitan District, we hope this pandemic year is looking brighter and wish you a great summer. Indian Mountain is the place to be.

We have been working on routine maintenance issues (e.g., RV dump station, Comfort Station, water meter compliance, financial accounting) but also some not-so routine projects like an open enrollment season for 30 new residents to join our IM Water Service Program, filling a Board vacancy, updating the IMMD website, and work at Breton Park (formerly called Gold Pan Park).

The District is doing well and is in good hands. Financial matters are solid and there is an experienced team of five Board members. Our next administrative adventure is called a "Reserve Study"; that is, what is the useful and remaining life of all our IM assets like the comfort station, lodge, picnic pavilion, dump station, community center, decks, parking areas, signage, trails, playground, etc. Replacement or refurbishment of these facilities needs to be planned for in our 5-year budget. The outcome of this project will better enable us to allocate monies into a reserve account for such events.

Please know you are welcomed to attend our monthly regular business Board meeting convened on the second Saturday of each month from 9-11am, followed by the monthly meeting of the Indian Mountain Property Owners Association. It is

a great way to meet people and get informed about the issues facing Indian Mountain.

The Lodge is open for rental and is filling up quickly for the summer months, if you or your guests need to reserve it, I would encourage you to contact the office and check dates and get penciled in on the calendar. We will be doing a little furniture (graciously donated items) and decorating upgrades to make it more lodge like, so keep your eyes on the new website for pictures.

The IMMD has added a locking lid to our **Dump Station** this year to help cut down on outside use and overfilling. This lid requires the same square key that opens the water pump there for rinsing. If you have that key, you don't need anything else. If you do need the key, please stop by the Community Center office during business hours, 9:00 -1:00, Wednesday through Saturday. The keys are \$25.00, and you will need proof of address.

The Burn Pit is scheduled to open on June 4th and 5th from 9:00 to 5:00. The pit will be open if we have volunteers to man the shifts from 9:00 to 1:00 and from 1:00 to 5:00 each day, so if you can volunteer, please do. Sign up online at indianmountain.info, on NextDoor or call the office at 719-836-9043 and let me know. The Pit closes once it is full, so the rush is on to get your slash here!

The Community Center is again hosting weekly events for the community to participate in for free.

Disc Golf Anyone?



Looking for something to do with friends and/or family while you are enjoying Indian Mountain? How about Disc Golf? This is a great way to enjoy the fresh air and scenery (and get your exercise too)! We have an 18 "hole course" right in the

Indian Mountain Park located at 1996 Chief Trail. Disc golf, much like traditional golf, is all about getting your disc into the basket at the end of a hole with the fewest throws possible. Compared to frisbees (that can be used), disc golf discs are smaller in diameter, heavier, and made from specialized plastics that help their durability and flying characteristics a great deal. They also fly further and can fly more accurately when thrown properly by throwing the disc flat, straight, and with sufficient power.





When enjoying a round of golf, keep these things in mind:

- 1. Always obey Indian Mountain Park Rules.
- 2. Respect the course and the mountain.
- 3. Let faster players play through.
- 4. Return lost discs that you may find to the equipment box.
- 5. Stay hydrated.
- 6. Consider carrying a whistle or airhorn to scare off wildlife that you may encounter, or bring a buddy who runs slower than you do 🕃

Rich Reindel, an Indian Mountain property owner and a long-time volunteer, is the web master for both the IMPOA and IMMD websites. In addition to meeting the ADA requirements, it needed to be accessible by more than one specific person and from any computer – not just a specific computer. IMPOA Dumpster Day 2021

Please mark your calendars for Sunday, July 4th; from 8:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.

IMPOA will have **THREE 40-yard dumpster containers again this year** in the parking area at the Community Center, 31 Keneu Ct. IMPOA provides these dumpsters to ALL Indian Mountain property owners for disposal of unwanted refuse.

As always, **there are some items not allowed in the containers**, such as tires, paint, electrical items, light bulbs, oil, appliances with Freon (refrigerators), any type of slash or trees (take them to the burn pit), and any type of hazardous waste or garbage. These restrictions are those of the dumpster supplier, not IMPOA, so we cannot make exceptions. Items that are allowed include furniture, construction

material, household items, and general non-hazardous refuse. This is a great way to clean up, clean out and spruce up our beautiful homes.

PLEASE break down large bulky items (dressers, cabinets, cardboard boxes, etc.) to save time and consolidate space in the dumpsters. **Mattresses MUST be dry**. They are extremely heavy if allowed to get wet.

The dumpsters are free to IMPOA members in good standing (dues are current). For non-members, the cost is \$45, which pays for your IMPOA membership, and then the dumpsters are free! Monitors will be checking loads and will have a current members list for verification. Please, no early arrivals. We start at 8:00 am on the dot will close at 2:00 pm or when the dumpsters are full. With three dumpsters, we expect to be open past noon, as has been the case in previous years.

Note: Again this year, there will be a metal scrapper on-site to take large and small metal items.
